



Health care systems throughout the world are faced with providing 'value for money' at a time of rising health care costs, increasing demand for health care, and a finite set of available resources. This session is designed to provide attendees with an introduction to economic evaluation – a systematic approach to decision making characterized by inputs (costs), outputs (consequences) and scarcity. Whether you're thinking of conducting an economic evaluation, or you're interested in learning more about the topic, this session is for you.

Introduction to economic evaluation within the Canadian healthcare system

Health technology research and innovation is moving rapidly. To decide how new technologies will impact health system resource allocation, it is important to consider both benefits and costs. This introductory workshop will review different types of economic evaluations (cost utility analysis, cost-consequence analysis, budget impact analysis), how to incorporate economic evaluation into your research, and how to interpret the results. Please note: This is an introductory course so we will not cover how to program economic evaluations.

Economic evaluation: Costing

While clinical and patient benefits should always be the primary consideration for resource allocation in a healthcare organization, these decisions must often be made within a context of resource scarcity. Therefore, optimizing value for a patient population necessitates calculating the costs of interventions. This workshop is designed to describe different approaches and definitions of costing including: fixed vs. variable, indirect vs. direct, and dark green vs. light green. The workshop will include a combination of didactic teaching and group exercises to explore this topic.

Evaluation 101: Conducting evaluation for decision making January 24 | 8:30 a.m. - 1:00 p.m. | Microsoft Teams | <u>Register</u>

How do you know your program or your intervention is successful? Was it implemented as planned? How do you measure success?

This workshop will help you discover how evaluation concepts can facilitate planning your program (includes initiatives/ interventions/processes) for a more successful implementation. This is a case-based workshop and you are asked to bring real life examples of programs/initiatives/ processes that you want to evaluate. Evaluation cases will also be used. This workshop will benefit those who need to plan a program and/or develop an evaluation plan for an already established program. Time will be set aside to work on individual or team based evaluations.

Economic evaluation: Priority setting and resource allocation

This lunch and learn will offer participants an introduction to priority setting and resource allocation (PSRA), and an opportunity to explore principles and applications through a combination of didactic teaching, exercises, and discussion. It will begin by introducing the two main principles of health economics (scarcity and opportunity cost), and present the three frameworks for PSRA from ethics, political science, and economics. Participants will learn about the theory of multi criteria decision analysis (MCDA) that underlies these frameworks, and have the ability to apply the knowledge they gain within a group exercise.



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Logic model for planning and evaluation April 4 | 8:30 a.m. - 12:30 p.m. | Microsoft Teams | <u>Register</u>

Are you going to plan or evaluate a Fraser Health program (includes initiatives, interventions, processes)?

A logic model is the core of program planning and evaluation. It illustrates what the program is planned to do and accomplish. A logic model is a tool used to facilitate transparency during the planning/evaluation process, anticipate unintended consequences and guide the selection of outcomes. The workshop will cover basic components of logic models and you will learn how to develop one for your program.


