
## New and Noteworthy

#### CHIEF MEDICAL HEALTH OFFICER'S REPORT



On June 19, Fraser Health released its most recent Chief Medical Health Officer's report, focussing on young adults, women, and South Asian men who have died from illicit drug toxicity. These focus populations were selected because we identified increases in the number of deaths in these demographic groups. #### FIRST NATION HEALTH AUTHORITY DATA ON OVERDOSE CRISIS



On July 6, the First Nations Health Authority released new data on increases in illicit drug toxicity deaths among Status First Nations people in British Columbia. In the first five months of 2020, deaths increased by 93% for all First Nations people. First Nations women continue to experience very high rates of overdose deaths. ### Program Updates

#### FRASER HEALTH OPIOID STEWARDSHIP PROGRAM

The Fraser Health Opioid Stewardship program has continued to be active in its Case Review and Feedback program which provides surveillance of opioid prescribing focused at Royal Columbian Hospital and Surrey Memorial Hospital. In April and May 2020, a total of 761 patients were screened and 260 patients received 500 interventions aimed at optimizing and ensuring the safe prescribing of opioids.

An increasing proportion of the cases are now arising from referrals from other health professionals (over 50 per month in April and May) indicating that the program is gaining recognition as a valuable resource for health care teams. In the near future, the Opioid Stewardship team plans to roll out a new surgical discharge prescribing guidance tool to help ensure that appropriate quantities of discharge opioids are prescribed after common surgical procedures.

The team is also actively involved in evaluating the impact of the Opioid Stewardship Program by analyzing longer term trends in prescribing of opioids and sedative-hypnotic drugs at Fraser Health sites.

#### MENTAL HEALTH AND SUBSTANCE USE SERVICES

- MHSU staff and other FH staff in each community formed Integrated Response Teams (IRTs), which
  respond together with family practitioners, to referrals for people who are homeless for
  Emergency Response Centres (ERCs) and Isolation Centres (ICs) to support people to physical
  distance and people who are symptomatic for covid-19
  - Addiction consultation, harm reduction and other health support services are offered at ERCs and ICs
- Received funding from MMHA to implement Substance Use Integrated Teams (SUIT) in Fraser East
  to engage and retain adult clients in treatment and recovery services, and support people to move
  seamlessly between services in the system
- Opened a Virtual Health Addictions Clinic (VHAC) which offers virtual addictions care to augment services at Community OAT clinics without physician coverage; RAAC to facilitate retention to care while promoting self-isolation to reduce transmission of COVID-19; ERCs and ICs, which provide a space to self-isolate. Between April 1 and June 30<sup>th</sup>, there were 385 total visits, and 48 individuals were started or restarted on Opioid Agonist Treatment.

#### **EMERGENCY NETWORK**

- Seven FH EDs are partnering with the BC Patient Safety and Quality Council in the provincial Learning about Opioid Use Disorder (LOUD) in ED project.
- All FH EDs are now providing Safer Injection Kits to patients who use injectable substances for harm reduction purposes.
- Emergency Network and MHSU program leads are working in partnership with the Mental Health Commission of Canada (MHCC) to undertake a formal evaluation of a trauma and resiliency training program (TRIP) for 100 FH Emergency Department (ED) staff members. The goal is to understand its potential effectiveness in reducing stigmatizing attitudes and behaviours and improve compassion satisfaction and resiliency among health care providers. Program planning is currently underway for October implementation.
- SUSAT referrals from FH ED's have continued to rise over the past year, with a milestone of over 1000 referrals achieved for the month of July alone.

# Fraser Health Surveillance Summary January 2020

#### **FATAL OVERDOSES**

Across British Columbia, record numbers of drug toxicity deaths occurred in May and June 2020. According to the BC Coroners Service, there were 51 suspected illicit drug toxicity deaths in Fraser Health in June 2020, compared with 54 in May 2020. Compared with 2019, deaths have increased by the largest margin in Maple Ridge, Coquitlam, Langley, and New Westminster (see Table 1). These counts are subject to change as additional data are received.

Illicit drug toxicity deaths reported by BC Coroners Service include illicit drug overdoses involving street drugs (heroin, cocaine, MDMA, methamphetamine, etc.), medications that were not prescribed to the deceased, combinations of the above, with prescribed medications, and those overdoses where the origin of drug is not known.

^Community assigned based on location of overdose and if that is missing, location of death.

#### OVERDOSES ATTENDED BY BC AMBULANCE

**NOTE:** Starting with the July 2019 report, Fraser Health's surveillance definition of suspected overdose events attended by BC Ambulance Service has been modified to include only probable opioid overdose events and suspected overdose events excluding medication overdoses.

In May 2020, there were 579 overdoses responded to by BC Ambulance Services across Fraser Health, compared to 475 in April 2020. The majority of overdoses year to date occurred among males (75%) and people aged 20 to 39 years (56%). 33% of persons declined transportation to medical services from BC Ambulance.
