Promote a shared responsibility for child development. Challenge social norms, structures or practices that uphold racism and discrimination.

Implement strategies that address the root causes of ACEs

Change the social conditions that lead to ACEs and develop resilience in children, families and communities.

Influence healthy public policy

Advocate for equitable local and provincial policies that reduce stress on families and create enriching positive environments.

Use data to inform our actions

Use an evidence-based approach and collect meaningful data so that we offer effective programs and measure our progress.

Engaging in mutually reinforcing actions along each pathway to change to increase protective factors and decrease risk factors for ACEs.

Children & youth

Grow up with their basic needs met and have safe and nurturing relationships with family and other supportive adults.

Families

Have strong social support structures and stable, positive relationships with the people around them.

Community

Is a safe place for families to grow and offers supports when needed.

Society

Upholds the rights of all children and provides structures and policies that promote equity and inclusion.

Using both universal and targeted approaches to advance equity.

Advancing equity with priority populations

Colonialism, discrimination and other structural inequities have resulted in policies and practices that channel significant stress into some communities more than others.

This creates environments that increase the risk of ACEs and undermine child well-being. We will engage with those who are impacted the most and co-develop solutions based on their sources of resilience and strength.
