The facts about toxic drug poisoning



Over 10,000 people in B.C. have died from toxic drug poisonings since 2016.

More than **3,150** people in the Fraser Health region.

The contamination of the illicit drug supply is killing people.

In 2021, fentanyl or its analogues were present in **86%** of illicit drug toxicity deaths in BC.

Since 2012, the number of annual deaths in BC has increased steadily, reaching **2,267** in 2021.



Fentanyl is present in most samples




Unintentional toxic drug deaths are the leading cause of unnatural death in BC.

COVID-19 emergency declared on 17 March 2020 (short dash grey line)




Toxic Drug Poisoning Events in Fraser Health April 2023

Men account for seven out of ten toxic drug deaths in BC.






Over 70 per cent of deaths are between the ages of 30-59


5.3 X First Nations people died at 5.3 times the rate of other BC residents in 2022 (Jan-June). This number was 5.4 for the same time period in 2021.



- Raise awareness to break down long-standing stigmas towards people who use drugs.


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Toxic Drug Response and Priority Populations Prevention of Harms related to Substance Use

Fourier-transform infrared (FTIR) spectrometers can identify up to six substances in a drug sample.




Overdose Outreach Teams (OOT)

We work in allyship with people who are at risk of illicit drug poisoning and are not accessing health supports to reduce harms, without necessarily having them stop using substances






Integrated Homelessness Action teams (IHART)



- Regional network of multidisciplinary care providers to support the needs of people who are sheltered, unsheltered and living in encampments and select supportive housing environments.
 - Stabilize and treat chronic health conditions, including mental health and substance use disorders
 - Support transitions to shelter or housing in collaboration with BC Housing and other partners
 - Support people's stability in their new housing through continuity of care and quick response to escalating or destabilizing health concerns
 - Reduce risk of overdose and other lifethreatening incidents

What is happening in BC?

British Columbia is in the midst of a public health emergency due to toxic drugs. It is affecting everyone, regardless of their job, education, age, ethnicity and race. Tragically, 2,224 people across B.C. lost their lives due to overdose caused by toxic drugs in 2021. In the Fraser Health region, our families, friends, neighbours and even ourselves, can be affected by the toxic drug crisis. When someone is using substances (drugs) that are illicit, they cannot check for the drug's contents, dosage (amount) and potency (strength). They may not know what is in their substance (drug), which can sometimes lead to an accidental overdose.

Why should this matter to me?

We sometimes hide our struggles, especially when they might affect how other people think of us. Therefore, we might not know what someone else is going through. By educating ourselves and others, we are reducing stigma and creating a safe space for our loved ones and our community.
