

FRASER HEALTH OVERDOSE EMERGENCY PUBLIC REPORT – APRIL 2019

WHAT'S HAPPENING

Fraser Health and its partners are working hard to reduce opioid/fentanyl-related overdoses, including the following:

- An opioid dialogue session was held in Agassiz, co-hosted by Fraser Health and with over 50 attendees.
- Fraser Health, in partnership with Surrey RCMP and Surrey Fire Services, was selected as one of five finalists in the MaRS Opioid Data Challenge for their Overdose Cluster Analysis Application. More information on the Opioid Data Challenge is available here: http://www.healthdatachallenge.com/

FATAL OVERDOSES

According to the BC Coroners Service, there were 35 suspected illicit drug overdose deaths in Fraser Health in March 2019, compared with 26 in February 2019.

OVERDOSES ATTENDED BY BC AMBULANCE

In March 2019 there were 659 overdoses responded to by BC Ambulance Services across Fraser Health, compared to 640 in February 2019. The majority of overdoses year to date occurred among males (69%) and people aged 19 to 39 years (54%). 25% of persons declined transportation to medical services from BC Ambulance.
